Reflection (John)

A Reflection for Pentecost Sunday from Revd John

When the Holy Spirit fell upon the disciples on the day of Pentecost, we are told that it came with "a sound like the rush of a violent wind". This is just one of a number of places in the Bible where the movement and work of God's Spirit is compared to the wind. In John's Gospel, Jesus tells Nicodemus, "The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." (John 3.8). In the very first book of the Bible, we are told that at the beginning of creation "a wind from God swept over the waters." (Genesis 1.2). There is a big overlap between the words that are used for "wind", "breath" and "spirit". All speak of something that is God-given and beyond our control.

We experience the blowing of the wind in various and distinctly different ways, from a refreshing, gentle breeze to a terrifying gale. The movement of God's Spirit can feel at times like something welcome, bringing renewal, but also at times as something dangerous and disturbing. The Spirit can take us where we would rather not go. The Spirit can revive us where we are. What it rarely ever does is to leave us unchanged and unmoved.

I am no sailor, and it is perhaps those who have experience of handling a yacht in open waters who can testify most fully to the contrasting aspects of wind. When the storm blows up, the power of the wind is rightly something to be feared; without skilful and urgent action, the vessel may capsize or be driven onto rocks. But I have heard it said that for sailors on a long-distance voyage, on a boat without its own motor, what is feared most is not the wind but the absence of wind. There is a dread of the doldrums around the equator; those days and weeks when there is not a breath of wind to catch the sails and the boat is left marooned and (quite literally) powerless.

There can be times in life when the wind around is raging so hard that we feel we have no choice but to batten down the hatches and ride out the storm. But that can only ever be a temporary measure. There also comes a time when we need to open up and allow the wind to fill the sails and move us forward. The days after the ascension of Jesus were days of inactivity, as the disciples waited in Jerusalem in obedience to Jesus' words. But with Pentecost the time of waiting is over; from now on, the wind of the Spirit will drive the disciples onwards and outwards with the good news of the risen Christ. The mission of the church begins in earnest, as empowered by God the followers of Jesus speak and serve in his name, and the kingdom grows.

How have these weeks of lockdown felt to you? Like a storm to be weathered? Or perhaps like the doldrums, a period of enforced inactivity during which we can go nowhere and do nothing? If so, that does not make them wasted weeks, but

quite possibly times of being made ready for challenges to come. It is not at all clear quite how or when there will be a full lifting of the restrictions on what we can do and where and how we can meet. For some things, we can only wait and see, and as many have said, there will not be and should not be a simple "return to normal", a going back to everything the way it was. I pray that this may have been a time of reflection and re-evaluation, enabling us to be more ready to discern where the wind of the Spirit is blowing, and to catch that wind in our sails, and to go with boldness wherever God leads.
