An Act of Worship for the Sunday after Ascension 24 May 2020

Alleluia. Christ is risen. **He is risen indeed. Alleluia.**

Almighty God, your Son has opened for us a new and living way into your presence. Give us new hearts and constant wills to worship you in spirit and in truth; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

In the letter to the Hebrews, we hear these words of encouragement:

'Since we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.'

So a moment of quietness, as we then confess our sins to God:

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, 'men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven.' Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath's day's journey away. Reflection for the Sunday after Ascension Day Acts 1.6-14 John 17.1-11

This may just be me, as somebody who is not that up on computer science, but I remember getting very confused when I first heard people talking about storing things in "the cloud". I knew in practice what was meant. Instead of (or as well as) storing files on the hard drive of your own computer, you could back those documents up through the internet. But it was the reference to the cloud that threw me. How can you store something in a cloud, something that's made up of water vapour? And even when I twigged that we weren't talking about literal clouds here, the image persisted of data somehow floating around "up there".

Of course, the cloud in computing isn't actually up there in the sky at all. I'm not exactly sure where it is, if anywhere. The advantage of cloud storage is precisely that the data is not kept in a single place, and so you can access it from anywhere, and your precious documents and photos are not going to be lost forever if you accidentally spill coffee on your laptop. The cloud is both everywhere and nowhere; but what it isn't is physically and literally up there in the sky. The image of the cloud is a vivid metaphor, used to help us visualise something that is not in fact visible.

And I wonder if perhaps something similar is going on with the language of clouds and heaven in the story of the Ascension. It is quite natural and common to talk of heaven as a place "up there", and of God as being above us in the sky. In the Gospel reading, when Jesus prays to the Father, we are told that "he looked up to heaven". It is the same word that the Bible uses for heaven as for sky. But is heaven really a physical place "up there"? There are those these days who sneer at religion, making out that believers all hold a naïve and literal view of God as a man with a white beard sitting up on a cloud in the sky, where we'll join him with our harps when we die; and yet most Christians understand that heaven is not a literal, physical place up above our heads, and that God is Spirit and transcends the restrictions of time and space. We use the language of "up there" to express a dimension of reality that goes beyond the capacity of our imaginations to visualise or our words to express.

So when we read the story of the Ascension, and Luke tells us that Jesus "was lifted up and a cloud took him out of their sight", we don't need to tie ourselves up in knots trying to define exactly where he has gone, or how. In fact, maybe this cloud into which Jesus is taken is not so very different from the cloud where the documents on our computers are safely stored. Through the ascension, Jesus is now fully in the presence of the Father. Physically, he is absent from the disciples and has passed out of their sight; but because he is no longer located in a single place on earth, he can be and is present to us all as our risen and ascended King. So let us not stand looking up into the sky, at the clouds; let us look out to the world around us, and serve that world in the name of the one who has promised to be with us always, even to the ends of the earth.
