#### **Ascension Day Sermon 2021**

#### Acts 1.1-11 Luke 24.44-end

It may seem rather strange to begin a sermon for Ascension Day by focussing on a Gospel passage that is more associated with Easter than the Ascension, but that is what I am going to do. It is the part of St John's Gospel where Mary Magdalene encounters the risen Jesus in the garden on the first day of the week after Jesus had been laid in the tomb. It is one of the most beautiful readings in the whole of the Bible, with a deep poignancy in this case of mistaken identity, when, looking through her veil of tears, Mary thinks that the figure she can see is the gardener. But then comes the flash of recognition when he speaks her name: "Mary". "Rabbouni!" she replies. "Teacher".

But it is the words that follow that speak to us today, as Jesus says to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father."

"Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father." You can picture the scene. Realising that this is Jesus, whom she loved, whom she thought was dead, indeed whom she knew had died, that he is standing before her in the flesh, her immediate instinct is to fling her arms around him and not let go. The one she loved, the one she thought she had lost for ever, has been returned to her. Who wouldn't cling on to his living, breathing body, in the warmest and most lasting of embraces?

We have learnt a lot this last year about the importance of physical contact. Phone calls, face time, a socially distanced wave through a window – these things are all very well, but they are no substitute for a hug. There will be many people in the country, and perhaps some of us, who will have heard the news about the lifting of restrictions on hugging friends and family with enormous joy and relief. There will be hugs, and some will last a long time.

So it is no wonder that Mary wants to keep Jesus in her arms, but it is not to be. He cannot stay on this earth. The ascension must happen. Mary, who let him go once, as he made his journey to the cross, must let him go again, ready for him to be taken up to the right hand of his heavenly Father.

So there is a sense in which the ascension of Jesus involves a process of letting go, of departure. Moving on to the account that we heard in Luke and in Acts, the gathered disciples are bidding farewell to Jesus, and he to them. This will be the last time that they see him, physically, here on earth.

But one of the extraordinary and perhaps surprising aspects of this story of the ascension is that this is a farewell without a trace of sorrow or sadness. In fact, quite the reverse. Listen again to how Luke's Gospel ends: "While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. And they worshipped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; and they were continually in the temple blessing God."

This is the most joyful of goodbyes. The story of the ascension is not a story of loss. Partly, of course, that is because of the promise that Jesus will not leave them orphaned, but will send to them the Holy Spirit. God's presence will be known as a constant in the lives of all believers. But it is also because, in ascending to heaven, Jesus is blazing a trail that the rest of us will follow. This is not Jesus being separated from the rest of humanity, but taking humanity into the very heart of the Godhead. "Where I am, there you will be also", he had said to his disciples. Or, in the words that he spoke to Mary in the garden on that first Easter Day, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Christ's crucifixion, resurrection and ascension bring us the assurance of union with him and with the Father, now and into all eternity. Thanks be to God. Alleluia.
