(1 November)



You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, called out of darkness into his marvellous light. (1 Peter 2.9)

A reading from the Book of Revelation 7.9-15

After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying,

'Salvation belongs to our God, who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!'

All Souls' Day

(Commemoration of the Faithful Departed)

2nd November

All Souls' Day is a day on which we remember with thanksgiving all those who have gone before us and are now at rest. We remember especially members of our family and our friends, whether they died recently or many years ago.

It is a day on which we can renew our trust in the promise of Jesus, our Good Shepherd, who said, "*I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one can snatch them out of my hand.*" (John 10.18)

It has been our tradition to hold services in church at this time of year, at which we remember by name those known to us who have died, and light candles as symbols of our love, hope and prayers. Whether or not you can attend such a service this year, you can be assured that those whom you love are remembered and are held in God's love.

A Prayer for All Souls' Day

Lord God, creator of all, you have made us creatures of this earth, but have also promised us a share in life eternal. According to your promises, may all who have died in the peace of Christ come with your saints to the joys of your kingdom, where there will be neither sorrow, nor pain, but life everlasting. Amen.

A Reading from 1 Peter 1.3-9

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, who are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. In this you rejoice, even if now for a little while you have had to suffer various trials, so that the genuineness of your faith – being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire - may be found to result in praise and glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed. Although you have not seen him, you love him, and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him, and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

Here is a prayer to say as you do so:

Hear us, O merciful Father, as we remember in love all those who have passed from our sight but not from our hearts, and especially.... (Say the name(s) of those you are remembering)
